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NEWS UPDATES

North East Link Update: Michelle Giovas

I am still on the North East Link Community Liaison Group (CLG) North representing Warringal Conservation Society and Friends of Banyule.

In October last year, the government announced with much spin a revised design for the NEL Project. A map of the updated design is available at this link, https://bigbuild.vic.gov.au/__data/assets/pdf_file/0005/598442/NEL-Project-Map-October-2021.pdf

The changes or clarifications include:

- The tunnel has been extended by 1.9kms.
- Tunnel will emerge at Lenola St, near Yallambie Rd in the North and at the old Bulleen Drive in site at the South.
- By taking Simpson Army Barracks land, Greensborough Highway will be widened to be a three-lane carriage way in each direction (described as a 'tree lined boulevard') from Lower Plenty Rd to Watsonia Rd.
- The longer Tunnel will be part bored by the Tunnel Boring Machine, and part cut and cover.
- Lower Plenty Rd Interchange has been modified but will be cut and cover construction.

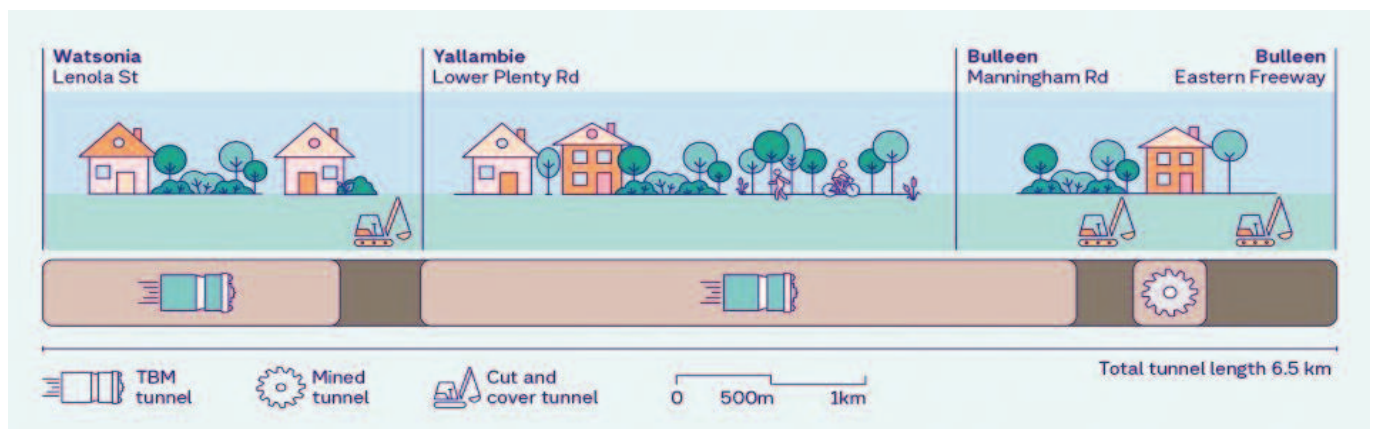
The longer tunnel is an improvement as land (although cleared) will be returned as 'Open Space'. That is from native plains dry grassy woodland with significant River Red and Studley Park Gums loss, to constructed bike paths, hard landscape etc.

Areas of concern are:

- Much of the disruptive and environmentally damaging Early Works was unnecessary i.e. removal of 12 homes in Yallambie.
- The quiet and unassessed increase in Matted Flax Lilly removal from 95 plants to 139 which is an increase of 46 %.
- A five-level carpark to be built at Watsonia Station is very poorly designed, and is a physical and visual barrier blocking the station and shopping centre from the east.
- Simpson Army Barracks land, Windsor Reserve and Garbonia Reserve will be major staging areas for the seven-year construction build. Land needed for this is approximately a massive 12 hectares!
- The tunnel emerges south of Watsonia Station and shops, when it should emerge north.
- Two green bridges crossing the trenched NEL are located at Elder Street and Watsonia Road. The community are arguing for the area between to be covered also and open space returned for more pedestrian and cycling access.

In the next few months NELP intends further consultation on the Urban Design and Landscape Plan via Engage Victoria.

FAUNA REPORT

UNUSUAL FIND - Button Quail

During January, my son found a dead bird in his swimming-pool. He put it in a plastic box in his freezer, and eventually brought it to me. I was most surprised to find a female Painted Button-quail. Not a suburban bird at all, but there are many records of them turning up in suburban gardens with some shrub cover, where they may stay a few days.

Their normal habitat is open woodland hillsides, where they scratch in leaf-litter. They clear small round 'platelets' by rotating, while standing on one foot and scratching with the other. They are very similar to True Quail, except that they have no hind-toe, and sex-roles are reversed. The female is larger and more colourful, and after laying a clutch of eggs, leaves the male to brood and rear the chicks. Like all ground-dwelling birds, they are very vulnerable to foxes and cats.

The specimen I photographed must have been flying along Darebin Creek line, probably en route to the Parklands. There is a small wound on the breast - perhaps it was struck by a hawk, and fell into the pool. As it was in excellent condition, and found nearby, I

decided to give it to Darebin Parklands, to add to their collection of mounted birds. Ranger Pete Wilshire was very pleased. Note that there are hefty fines for retaining specimens of protected species.

I have not been to Healesville Sanctuary for a while, but on visits to the Woodland Aviary I have observed captive birds and their chicks, where I photographed a pair many years ago.

FEBRUARY > ANDREW WOOD

Regenerating the Yarra for a better future!

2022 kicked off with an interesting presentation by Andrew Wood, Specialist Advisor for the Yarra River Keeper Association (YRKA). Andrew advises YRKA on ecological regeneration and landscape architecture, ensuring planting plans are carried out with both aesthetic and ecosystem functions in mind.

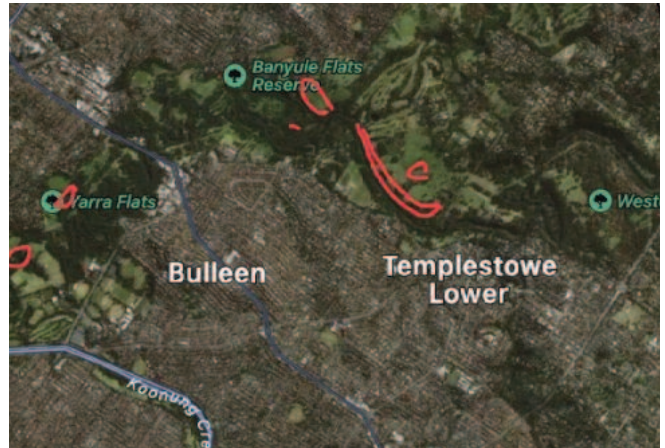
His work for the next two to three years will be to develop and facilitate a set of projects that will result in a healthier, less weed infested and fragmented Yarra. Presently there are 10 sites earmarked, each with a diversity of goals. These will be achieved through ecological planning, planting, weeding, and further maintenance in collaboration with local groups.

The plan is to link remnant vegetation islands to create corridors. He briefly outlined some the current issues. For example, the lack of diversity of the vegetation along the river valley. Tree Violets are taking over due to lack of regular flooding. Many old plantings are undermined by senescence or weeds. Generally, plantings only last about 15 years, then need replacing - there is rarely natural recolonisation.

His aim for all new plantings to be climate resilient, as well as providing food and habitat.

Maintenance is a major consideration.

It takes 1-2 years to prep each site, then 2-3 to control weeds. Then what next? Very dedicated volunteers are needed to continue the work into the future. Andrew spoke about the difference between groups of volunteers. Older groups are generally built on long



friendships and site loyalty, compared to younger individuals that will go to any site but may not stay involved over time. It is often the preference of Parks Victoria and Councils to run volunteers through programs like ParkConnect as Friends Groups can become troublesome advocates for their sites.

He described site plans, planting methods, species lists, weed control etc for each of the sites presently underway: Andrews Reserve (Yarra Bend Park), Chandler corridor (near old APM), Phillips Fox Billabong (Yarra Flats), and others including around our own Windmill Swale at Banyule Flats. Andrew has some exciting plans for this and other sites in our area, and will be inviting all WCS members to be involved.

CAN YOU HELP?

Call out for local species sightings information

Paul Davis, BCC Biodiversity Advisor is developing a *No Local Extinction Plan* in 2022 for six key indicator species that are known to be present in the Banyule area. He's asking for help with local observations and information on the following species:

- Powerful Owl;
- Eltham Copper Butterfly;
- Swift Parrot;
- Platypus;
- Krefft's Glider (previously known as Sugar Glider).

The plan will enable Council to better understand the presence of these six key species and their habitat requirements. It will look at ways of protecting and enhancing these habitats, identify gaps and connection possibilities between fragmented habitats,

and identify community involvement opportunities, including ongoing monitoring programs.

If you are able to provide any observations on these species (please limit to the last 5 years) within Banyule or adjacent municipalities, which have not been formally reported, Paul would love to hear from you. Email: paul.davis@banyule.vic.gov.au.

NATURE NOTES

February 2022

James Deane showed some fine photos from his wildlife camera - a Fox at night at Banyule Swamp - it stalked a Snipe which escaped. An early morning shot of a Swamp Wallaby grazing, and a Wombat.

Anthea Fleming showed pictures of Kangaroos in Yarra Flats, and some insects - a Robber-fly with its prey, a Katydid, and a Wattle Goat Moth. Some birds from Wilson Reserve - a Red-rumped Parrot eating dock seeds, a Spotless Crake skulking in the Reedy Billabong, and an unusual visitor to Bailey's, an Azure Kingfisher.

Daphne Hards reported an Eastern Spinebill and a Brown Thornbill in her garden, White Ibis overhead and the unwelcome appearance of a Noisy Miner.

Celia Smith saw a very young Turtle on the Bike Path at Wilson Reserve.

King Parrots attacked **George Paras'** tomatoes. They seemed rather tame, as if someone has been feeding them. Lots of glider observations near glider box in back yard. Young glider became independent, and has moved away.

Rob Granter filmed a large female Wombat eating Tradescantia near the Plenty foot-bridge.

Dianne Williamson saw a flock of 15 Red-rumped Parrots near Bonds Road.

In early January, **Heather Smith** saw two Kookaburras having a tug-of-war with a dead rat. **Don Stokes** rescued a Bluetongue from Plenty Road.

Andrew Lees reported that the Annulus Billabong is now dry, but he had seen a Buff-banded Rail nearby. Also saw a Frogmouth family, parents and two young.
